About Lead Child Africa

Lead Child Africa (LCA), also known as the Lead Child Foundation, is a youth-led, purpose-driven nonprofit organization headquartered in Buea, Cameroon. Founded under the visionary leadership of Aleatanu Noela, whose lived experience as a survivor of sexual violence inspired a movement for change, the organization is dedicated to protecting, educating, and empowering vulnerable children and young people across Africa.

Existing since 2023 but formally recognized on **13 September 2024 with registration number 00001550/ARDA/JO6/SAJPA/APPB**, Lead Child Africa works through community-driven programs and strategic collaborations to create lasting impact. Our initiatives focus on providing access to education and vocational training that equip young people with essential life and job skills.



We empower women and girls mentally, emotionally, and economically through mentorship, mental health support, and entrepreneurship opportunities. We also deliver psychosocial support and mental health care to youths in distress, creating safe spaces for healing and growth.

Our work extends to facilitating access to healthcare services for underserved communities, promoting health equity, and championing environmental protection, leadership, and creativity through community campaigns, talent development, and civic engagement.

Our vision is rooted in the belief that when children are protected, inspired, and empowered, they can become the driving force for transformational change across Africa.

Vision

To build a future where every child, youth, and woman is equipped with knowledge, skills, and resources to become a powerful agent of positive change.

Mission

To establish and nurture a dynamic platform that promotes active youth participation, using inclusive approaches to address pressing issues affecting children, youth, and women. Through collaboration, we empower individuals, amplify their voices, and support sustainable solutions for a better future.

GOAL AREAS

Lead Child Africa focuses on six interconnected areas: Education Access & Quality, Child Protection & Safeguarding, Gender Equality & Empowerment, Health & Well-being, Advocacy & Systems Strengthening, and Community Engagement & Resilience. These goals aim to prevent abuse, keep children safe, ensure inclusive education, challenge harmful gender norms, improve mental and physical health, influence child-friendly policies, and mobilize communities to protect and support children especially in crisis-affected areas.

These areas operate as a network where each strengthens the other. Protection is reinforced by education, which keeps children safe and learning. Education becomes more impactful when it promotes gender equality, and equality thrives when health and well-being are prioritized. Strong health outcomes are supported by effective advocacy, which is rooted in engaged, resilient communities. By linking these areas, Lead Child Africa creates a holistic approach that safeguards children's rights, unlocks their potential, and sustains positive change even in the face of crises.

Goal Area 1

Education Access and Quality

Access to quality education remains a critical challenge in many communities affected by conflict and displacement in Cameroon. According to the UNICEF Cameroon Education Brief (2023), over 2 million children in the North-West and South-West regions are currently out of school due to ongoing insecurity, displacement, and economic hardship. This alarming figure underscores the urgent need for targeted interventions to ensure that every child has the opportunity to learn and thrive. In response, Lead Child Africa intensified efforts to support education continuity and inclusion. Our annual Back to School Campaign successfully distributed school kits including uniforms, stationery, and learning materials to over 250 children from vulnerable and displaced households, helping reduce barriers to school enrollment and attendance. We also partnered with local schools to run remedial classes for out-of-school and displaced children, integrating life skills and psychosocial support to address trauma and foster resilience. Through these initiatives, Lead Child Africa strives to bridge the education gap and keep children on the path to a brighter future.



Goal Area 2

Child Protection and Safeguarding

Lead Child Africa places the safety and well-being of children at the heart of its work by actively preventing and responding to all forms of abuse, exploitation, neglect, and violence. Among the most urgent concerns is sexual violence, including rape, which disproportionately affects children in conflict-affected and vulnerable communities (WHO, 2022).

To combat this, Lead Child Africa conducts extensive rape sensitization programs aimed at raising awareness about sexual violence, its consequences, and prevention strategies. These programs equip children, caregivers, teachers, and community members with the knowledge and tools to recognize, prevent, and report incidents of sexual abuse (UNICEF, 2023).

In addition, the organization runs school sensitization sessions that educate students and school staff about child rights, safeguarding policies, and how to create safe learning environments free from abuse and exploitation. These sessions empower children to understand their rights and encourage a culture of protection and respect within schools (Cameroon Ministry of Women's Empowerment and the Family, 2024).

For survivors of sexual violence and other forms of abuse, Lead Child Africa provides access to psychosocial support, medical care, and legal assistance, helping them heal and reclaim their dignity.

By strengthening community awareness, school-based protection mechanisms, and survivor support systems, Lead Child Africa fosters safe spaces where children can thrive free from harm.

Goal Area 3

Gender Equality & Empowerment

Lead Child Africa is committed to promoting gender equality by challenging harmful stereotypes and advocating for equal opportunities for girls and boys. In many communities affected by conflict and displacement, girls face significant barriers to education, leadership, and personal development, often due to deeply rooted cultural norms and stigma (UN Women, 2023).

The organization focuses on empowering young people to overcome these barriers by fostering attitudes of respect, inclusion, and equality. Efforts include community dialogues and educational activities that encourage positive gender norms, promote bodily autonomy, and support the rights of all children to live free from discrimination and violence (Plan International, 2022).

By nurturing confidence and agency among girls and boys, Lead Child Africa helps cultivate a generation of leaders who champion dignity, equality, and resilience in their communities.

Health & Wellbeing

Lead Child Africa recognizes that children's ability to learn, grow, and thrive is closely linked to their physical, mental, and emotional health. In conflict-affected and vulnerable communities, children often face heightened risks of malnutrition, poor menstrual health, limited access to healthcare, and untreated psychological trauma (WHO, 2023).

The organization works to advance child health by promoting nutrition, hygiene, psychosocial support, and access to basic healthcare services. This includes creating awareness on mental health, supporting safe water and sanitation practices, and encouraging open discussions on sensitive health topics such as sexual and reproductive health (UNICEF, 2023). Special emphasis is placed on equipping children and caregivers with accurate information and life skills to make informed health decisions and build resilience.

By addressing both the physical and psychosocial needs of children, Lead Child Africa contributes to nurturing healthier, more confident, and well-supported young people capable of reaching their full potential.

Community Engagements and Resilience

Lead Child Africa believes that lasting change for children is only possible when families and communities are actively involved in their protection and development. In crisis-affected areas, strong community engagement builds trust, encourages collective responsibility, and ensures that solutions are locally owned and sustainable (UNICEF, 2022).

The organization works to mobilize parents, traditional leaders, religious figures, youth groups, and local institutions to create safe, supportive environments for children. This involves strengthening community structures, raising awareness of child rights, and building local capacity to respond effectively during emergencies. By encouraging inclusive participation and dialogue, communities become better equipped to address risks, safeguard children, and recover from crises (UNDRR, 2023). Through this approach, Lead Child Africa fosters resilience enabling communities not only to withstand shocks but to emerge stronger, more united, and better prepared to support the next generation.

Our expenditure during the reporting period was primarily directed towards implementing program activities, operational costs, and ensuring the smooth delivery of our initiatives. A significant portion of these funds supported educational outreach, community sensitization, capacity building, and emergency response efforts.

Most of our financial resources came from contributions by family and friends, as well as donations from partners and small grants from supportive institutions.
